Aims

- Give students an opportunity to practice more realistic, typical short conversations that English speakers have when chatting.
- Develop awareness of similarities and differences between English and L1 (cultural as well as linguistic / grammatical).

*As there will be translations from English to L1 and back, a teacher with L1 competence is needed for these lessons, or a second teacher with L1 competence to help translate.

Lesson Activities and Stages

Students watch the video and practice reading aloud the 'Everyday Q & A'.

Main Activity – Translation WSs

Hand out Conversation Translation WS1 to all students. Whole-class read aloud practice. Then in pairs practice. Finally, get each pair to write down a translation 'as they would really say it' in their L1. Whole-class feedback on if any pairs have different translations / similarities and differences between how people communicate in English compared with L1.

*You can use either the paper version or if iPads/PCs are available, students can complete the digital version.
